Share the Road with Farm Vehicles / Equipment

While driving, please remain diligent of the various agricultural equipment on rural roads and highways.

Defensive driving tips for motorist:

- Be alert—Watch for farm vehicles on rural roads
- Keep your distance—Stay at least 15 meters or five care lengths back
- Slow down—As soon as you see a slow moving vehicle or piece of equipment, slow down
- Be patient
 - Don't assume a farm vehicle is pulling right to let you pass
 - Don't assume the farmer can move aside to let you pass
 - Don't pass until the road is clear of traffic and you are certain it is safe to pass
- Make sure you are clear—When passing make sure you can see the farm vehicle in your rear view mirror before you change back into the right lane


Protecting Roadside Workers

When approaching a construction zone, use extra caution, and slow down where people and equipment are working on or near the road. Obey all directions by flag people and signage. Be alert and patient so we can all get home safety.

Dutch Elm Disease

What You Need to Know & How You Can Help





Dutch Elm Disease & Elm Bark Beetle

Dutch elm disease (DED) is a costly, deadly disease that affects all species of elm trees in Alberta. It is a caused by a fungus that clogs the elm tree's water conducting system, causing the tree to die. The fungus is primarily spread from one elm tree to another by elm bark beetles.

Dutch Elm Disease Prevention:

- Elms should be well watered from April to mid August.
- Dead branches and trees that provide beetle habitats should be removed.
- Elm bark beetles are attracted to fresh tree wounds; therefore, pruning should be done between October 1 to March 31 when the beetles are not in their active stage.
- Dispose of all elm wood by taking it to your local transfer station or landfill. Chips should be no greater than 1 inch as elm wood provides an ideal breeding site for the tiny

Understanding Property Assessment



Property assessments are completed annually based on the previous year's market values. The assessment determines the amount of municipal and education tax each property owner pays.

Municipal assessments are audited by the Provincial government to ensure that proper valuation practices have been followed.

Determining the Assessed Value of Your Property

Market sets the value of your residential property. Market value assessments depend on the following variables:

- Geographic location
- Building size
- Building style

Size of land

- Number of bathrooms
- · Quality of finishing

- Basement development
- Other factors

Your 2021 residential assessment is based upon market conditions as of July 1, 2020 and physical characteristic date of December 31, 2020.

Did you know?

Education tax is set by the Province and collected by the County on behalf of the Province which makes up 22 % of the total taxes the County collects annually.

Public Lands / Crown Lands

Alberta's public lands / crown lands are owned by all Albertans and managed by our provincial and federal governments. Public land makes up about 60% of the total land in Alberta.

Public lands provide a safe haven for wildlife, healthy waters, natural resources, and a place for public recreation and industry.

OHV's can cause significant damage to the landscape and environment, including:

- Soil compaction, contamination and erosion
- · Loss of vegetation
- Transfer of weeds
- Water contamination
- Start of a wildfire
- Wildlife disruption



Keep Wheels Out of Water:

- prevent damage to fish habitat
- prevent silt from covering fish eggs
- Maintain clean waterways & water quality

Keep Distance From Shorelines:

- prevent shoreline erosion
- Prevent damage to aquatic plants

Keep Away From Wet Trails:


- prevent deep rutting & trail erosion
- maintain soil health

Keep Vehicles Free of Debris:

- prevent the start of wildfire
- Prevent the spread of weeds & seeds

Guidelines for Lakeshore & Reserve Land Use



What is Municipal Reserve?

Municipal Reserves provide parks and open space for area residents and the general public, as well as provide buffer strips, environmental reserves and walkways.

Photographed above is an example of County owned municipal reserve in proximity to the lake.

MYTH: I own the property right to the water's edge.

FACT: Your property is legally defined by the land title and registered survey plan of the parcel.

THINGS TO REMEMBER REGARDING MUNICIPAL RESERVE LANDS

- Reserve land includes municipal reserve and environmental reserve lands and can be found throughout the County, not just lakeside.
- Is owned by the County and is located between the lake shore and the private lot boundary.
 - Reserve land preserves and protects the bank and lakeshores.
 - Reserve land maintains public access to public lands.
 - (See pictured photograph for an example of County owned municipal reserve in proximity to a lake)
- Reserve land is for the general use and enjoyment of all members of the public.
- No resident has ownership or exclusive rights to any of the reserve land.
- Removal of trees and other vegetation on reserve land is prohibited without obtaining written approval from the County of Barrhead.
- Fires are permitted ONLY in designated fire pits and stoves within the reserve land. Fires must be supervised at all times and completely extinguished.
 All other fires require permits authorized by Fire Guardians. Please obey current fire orders.
- Use of vehicles, including off-highway vehicles, are prohibited on Municipal Reserve land.
- Digging, excavation, building on or use of reserve land for storage is prohibited without first obtaining written approval from the County of Barrhead and, in some cases, Alberta Environment.




County of Barrhead has begun **actively enforcing** bylaws relating to Municipal Reserve Land use and lakeshore protection.

- Two compliance requests with Real Property Reports (RPR's) triggered removal of personal structures and/or items from Municipal Reserve Lands.
- Three site visits resulted in removal of personal structures and remediation of Municipal Reserve Lands. Cost associated with the removal was recovered from the landowner for labor, seeding, and reforestation.
- One removal of an unauthorized dock.

County Community Peace Officers have been active in patrolling and responding to numerous complaints regarding quad and dirt bike use, municipal reserve land infractions, and dog / noise complaints.





Thinking about building......

a home, garage, shed, etc.?

Development permits and approvals need to be obtained for new construction, renovations, and changes to how a building or land is being used.

County staff must review the application to ensure it complies with the County's Land Use Bylaw. The Land Use Bylaw outlines the types of development allowed in each land use district and the rules and regulations governing those uses.

How to Tell Between A Real CRA Call and A Scam

Many of us have heard of scammers pretending they are from the Canada Revenue Agency (CRA). You may have even experienced a call yourself. How do you know what you can trust?



Remain cautious when you receive any forms of communication from someone claiming to be from the CRA, especially when asked for personal information such as a social insurance, credit card, or bank account number.

If you are unsure that the person on the phone is a legitimate agency employee, ask for the agent's phone number and badge number and contact the CRA at 1-800-959-8281 (individuals) or 1-800-959-5525 (businesses) to validate the caller.

WHO and WHAT is B.A.R.C.C.?

B.A.R.C.C. - Barrhead and Regional Crime Coalition is a regional partnership between the County of Barrhead, Town of Barrhead, Woodlands County, the R.C.M.P. and Barrhead & District Crime Watch Association.
