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# Amalgamation 2015 Message - from Mark Oberg, CAO

In September 2014, the Town of Barrhead Council provided notice to the County of Barrhead, and the Minister of Municipal Affairs, that the Town has initiated the process of amalgamating the Town and County to create a new municipality. That decision of the Town led to a number of actions being taken by both the Town and County. There were further letters to the Minister and there was a committee made up of both Councils established to discuss amalgamation and other collaboration options. Grants were applied for to access funds to pay for a study to assist our two municipalities.

Residents of the County should know that the Town and County have a long history of working together to provide services to their respective residents. This cooperative effort will continue, and hopefully be enhanced. One municipality initiating the process of amalgamation with another municipality is a topic that demands extensive study; both the pros and cons of amalgamation must be considered. One very important component the Province requires in a study for a proposed amalgamation is that the affected municipalities consult with the residents of each of the municipalities.

Alberta Municipal Affairs reports that in some cases, restructuring in the form of amalgamation may not be the best solution for local issues if other processes prove to be better options. The County Council is committed to do its due diligence in order to arrive at an outcome that will be a benefit to the citizens we serve in the County of Barrhead No. 11.

As I write this article, a number of steps have been taken in this initiative. ADR Education has been contracted to serve as facilitator/chair of the meetings involving the Council Members of the Town and County. At these meetings there will be discussions on: the infrastructure (buildings, roads, pipes, etc.) and services that are currently in place, the life expectancy of the infrastructure, and how these municipal assets and services could be improved in the future using different cooperative arrangements. As well, different methods of governance, which will include amalgamation of the two municipalities, will be explored and considered. GCS Consulting Inc. has been hired to conduct the study of these matters. We look forward to working with ADR Education and GCS Consulting; the meetings and the study will be very interesting. At a minimum, they will lead to a better understanding of our two municipalities and improvements in the services we deliver together. This outcome alone would make the efforts worthwhile.

### **Reeve's Message**

Hi Everyone! 2015 is going to be another busy year for the County of Barrhead. Though a considerable amount of time will be spent on Amalgamation talks with the Town of Barrhead this next year, we strive to make sure our commitment to serve our residents remains a priority. Council often gets asked about our Economic Development efforts, so I thought I would summarize our activities in this area.

In 2010 we formed an Economic & Community Development Committee (ECDC) to promote economic development and build up our community. We feel it's important to enhance our current lifestyle with a type of economic development that harmonizes with our way of life. An example of that can be seen in the promotional video that was produced last year and can be viewed on our website at www.countybarrhead.ab.ca.

We have very diverse industry - and therefore businesses - within the County, with the most prevalent being agriculture or ag-related industries. We have 667 farms with average sales of \$250,000 and an average net worth of \$1.5 million.. Collectively, the farms in the County generate in excess of \$166 million a year. What an impact on our community!

Our ECDC also feels it important to serve the existing businesses we have, rather than just enticing outside businesses to come in. We started a business visitation program, and have already visited over 15 corporate businesses, and conducted interviews with their management team. These talks continue not just with local business, but with outside interests as well. By making sure we are filling our local business needs should also ensure we have the right environment for others to come to our community.

Since it's inception, the ECDC has coordinated the following:

- A mission & vision statement that guides council in its decision making.
- Purchase a 1/4 section of land for future industrial development, with direct access to pavement, 3-phase power, gas, water and sewer.
- Promotional video created and launched in partnership with Town of Barrhead
- Community Investment Readiness (CIR) Action Plan and CIR Brochure created.
- Connections made with multiple stakeholders, including ADLC, Steeper Energy, Champion Pet Feeds, Integra Air, Alberta Community Cooperative Assoc., Chamber of Commerce, Realtors, Growth Alberta, and more.
- Annual Community Events Listing created.
- New Logo and Visual Identity for the County of Barrhead
- Airport Hangar Developments

# Public Works Department Update

#### **Road Construction:**

The following locations have been approved by the County of Barrhead for road reconstruction:

Through 2-58-3-W5; Through SW 11-58-2-W5 West of 16-60-2-W5; West of SW 21-60-2-W5 West of 1 and 12-61-4-W5; South and West of 14-61-4-W5 West of 23-61-4-W5

#### Work in County Right-of-Ways

Prior approval is required from the Public Works Department before any work can be done in County right-ofways. This includes, but is not limited to ditching, approaches, tree removal, etc. It is an offence to remove gravel from County of Barrhead roadways for personal use. Please contact the Public Works Department to purchase gravel.

### **Road Construction Safety**

We strongly encourage all motorists to watch carefully for traffic signs, warnings and to watch for crews working on or beside the road. Road construction accidents are high on the list of fatalities, so diligence is important.

### **Fire Department News - Agricultural Purpose Fire Permits**

"Annual Agricultural Purpose Fire Permit" means a permit issued to remove an immediate obstacle or nuisance in an agricultural or farming practice by burning such obstacle or nuisance.

Permits are to be issued no longer than one period at a time. Any fire lit under the authority of an Annual Agricultural Purpose Fire Permit shall not burn longer than a continuous 24 hour period of time, and **the holder of the fire permit must report when they start and stop the burn to a Fire Guardian.** 

**Reminder:** Fire Permits are required YEAR ROUND. Call the Fire Chief at 780.674.2087 or the County office at 780.674.3331 for a listing of Fire Guardians that can assist you in making sure your next burn is a safe one!



### **PLANT UPDATE:**

This plant is designated as **Prohibited Noxious** in Alberta, which means that under the Weed Control Act, it must be completely eradicated wherever it is found. Himalayan balsam *(Impatiens glandulifera)* is an annual plant that reproduces only by seed. **DESCRIPTION:** 

This weed grows extremely tall and fast, reaching up to 3m in height by the end of the season. Stems are erect, purplish and easily broken, leaves are lance-shaped and 6-15cm long, borne oppositely or in whorls. Leaf size decreases with height on the stem. They have large (2.5-4 cm long) pink flowers. At maturity, the seed capsules explode, flinging seed as far as 5m from the parent plant. This can result in seeds flinging to driveways where cars can transport to other locations. One plant may produce up to 800 seeds that remain viable when fully submerged underwater for up to two years.

Himalayan balsam requires moisture to flourish, hence its preference for riparian areas and waterways. This invasive plant is devastating to sensitive riparian habitats, shading out native vegetation and leaving soils exposed and susceptible to erosion when it dies in the fall.

Never purchase or grow Himalayan balsam.! It may be sold under several common names, including:

- Poor Man's Orchid
- Policeman's Helmet
- Indian Balsam
- Ornamental Jewelweed

Hand-pulling is by far the most effective control method, as Himalayan balsam has a shallow root system and often grows in areas that cannot be cultivated or mown. Bag the plants and take them to the landfill for burial. Both glyphosate and 2,4-D have shown efficacy against this plant; however, regulations on spraying near water must be followed. Plants in flower can still produce viable seed after being sprayed. Call if you have questions or want help identifying, we appreciate your help in controlling these weeds!
